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# COMMISSIONER DE LAS LLAGAS LECTURES ON RUNNING AN EXCELLENT UNIVERSITY

"What does it take to run an excellent university?"

his is the biggest thought provoking question that was raised by the Commissioner on the whole- day event last January 9, 2018 at Hotel Roma, Tuguegarao City. This, too, contained the theme of the day's conference attended by 84 university and campus officials of Cagayan State University.

Coping with complex and rapidly growing challenges of higher education institutions vying for excellence, and wanting to stay ahead of the pack, CSU President Urdujah A. Tejada initiated a lecture on Academic Leadership and Governance having the theme "Bringing Experiences and Perspectives on what it takes to Run an Excellent University".

Dr. Lilian A. De Las Llagas who has been in the academe all her life as a Professor, a Researcher, a scientist, a Board Secretary and now a Commissioner in the Commission on Higher Education, gladly welcomed the invitation of Dr. Tejada in her desire to advance excellence and elegance in the institution.

"Excellence is a decision, a statement of conviction, and non-negotiable. It is our day-to-day survival. An excellent university has an excellent operation leading to academically excellent performance. They are partners in line. Otherwise if you are just an academic leader but your operation is not getting on well, you have no university.", De las Llagas stressed.

Her lecture opened with a self-assessment exercise as participants were delighted with her symbolic messages putting emphasis on qualities that make up the fabric of a strong governance such as leadership by example, management by objectives, receptive to objections, work for success, positive attitude, effective communicator, good listener, mentor, professional appearance, and team player. In this exercise, a self-assessment form was distributed to each participant. On a scale of 1 to 3, they were tasked to tick appropriate boxes under the columns "How I view me" and "How others view me", 3 as the highest and 1 as the lowest in Likert Scale. The results were later tallied by Mr. Allan Leand Arquilada.

The participants viewed themselves and their partners highly as workers for success and as team players. However, they think of themselves as ineffective communicators and their partners view them as unreceptive to objections. These results served as a springboard to the next activities led by the commissioner.

Com. De Las Llagas' core lecture delved on how the university is run by a unique set of faculty members, researchers, professional staff, students, and administrative personnel who can deliver to the community the holistic functions of CSU through excellence in teaching, research, and public service. #### THE PARTNERSHIP CONTINUES: VAS VISIT CSU

our Canadian Executive Service Organization (CESO)
Volunteer Advisors conducted a series of training-workshops on various topics for University officials and select faculty members starting October to December 2017.

Professor George McRae, the first CESO Volunteer Advisor, was sent by CESO to discuss the principle guidelines in module writing and related topics including ethical standards on instructional materials development spearheaded by the Partnership and Resource Mobilization (PRM) Office.

VA McRae has a broad range of experience in a post-secondary education, including curriculum development and instruction, extension education, skills training, job creation, capacity



development, human resource inventories, and organizational management.

In a two-day workshop, the participants were grouped

according to their respective fields of expertise to learn the basics of instructional materials development and lay out plans in drafting their learning module. This has led to the development of

six different modules along language, math, physics, computer, natural sciences, social sciences and philosophy, and other professional subjects taught at the College of Allied Health Sciences (CAHS), College of Business, Entrepreneurship, and Accountancy (CBEA), College of Teacher Education (CTED), and College of Hospitality Industry Management (CHIM).

Critiquing and honing of the academic materials are underway as VA McRae and the faculty-authors are in constant contact to ensure that CSU's long-term partnership with CESO. President Tejada expects fruitful results of this visit made possible through a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) forged on June 1, 2017.

istrative functions must work in tandem where a high degree of professionalism is expected.

"It takes more than just the brains of the intelligent beings— in the academic sense, it must combine the science and art of managing ideas and people.", she emphasized.

Another point of inquiry which the Commissioner pressed on was on the ground or basis the existing organizational structure had been created. To get different viewpoints, she approached few university officials and gave their remarks. She urged the university to examine the functionality of its organizational structure in order

to be systematic and responsive.

The first half of her lecture focused on the challenges of the University such as policies and academic programs the Tejada administration has crystallized, setting apart CSU and making it a benchmark for other SUCs.

In the afternoon session, Commissioner de las Llagas focused her lecture and activities on the readiness of a progressive mind through a truly engaging activity called the Parallel Viewing or Clustered Thinking. The core values drawn from this activity were communication and attentiveness in making decisions. The participants were grouped into

three teams, the management and 2 executive teams, and where some members were initially assigned to wear colored crowns. Each colored crown represented roles in management and executive thinking. Wearing the crowns on frequent rotation, the members in each team discussed territoriality/turfing/encroachment aborts which are commonly identified conflicts that cut across the system of governance and execution. After which, the teams presented their strategies and steps to overcome the attitudinal challenge. The management team's output was presented by VP for Administrative and Finance Fr. Ranhilio C. Aquino, while the executives (team 1 and

team 2) were presented by Lallo Campus Executive Officer (CEO) Simeon Rabanal and Graduate School Dean Lilia Tamayao respectively. President Tejada assured that the output discussed and presented by each team shall be included in the executive committee agenda. Comm. De Las Llagas said it best concluding her lecture: "Be generous with your ideas but don't be paralyzed by judging."

Wrapping up the activity, president Tejada recapped few of Comm. De Las Llagas' symbolic quotes which she believed had penetrated the hearts and minds of the CSUans.

#### **CEOS UNDERGO EVALUATION FOR THE FIRST TIME**



ight Campus Executive
Officers (CEO) of CSU had
undergone, for the first
time, a performance evaluation conducted on December
11-14, 2017, spearheaded by the
University Planning and Quality
Assurance (UPQA).

CSU President Urdujah A. Tejada, who conceived the evaluation together with UPQA Director Leticia A. Dumlao said the goal of the evaluation was to objectively measure the performance of CEOs in terms of how well they are carrying the mission, vision, and goals of the University.

"The result shall be an input for planning, recognition, and a room for improvement." the President stressed.

Regent (BoR) Rex L. Navarro (Private Sector Representative of the CSU-Board of Regents) chaired the evaluation team composed of four members: UPQA Director Leticia A. Dumlao, Vice-President (VP) for Research Development & Extension (RDE) Engr. Junel B. Guzman, VP for Partnership and Resource Mobilization (PRM) Lina M. Garan, and University Consultant Florentina S. Dumlao. Acting as secretariat and data analysts include Erika Bianca D. Tabilas & Allan Leand P. Arquilada from the UPQA Office and Zoe Thea A. Benito & Arman Loui P. Arquilada from the RDE Office.

On a scheduled visit to the eight campuses, the team administered the floating of questionnaires to a total of 785 respondents composed of teaching & non-teaching personnel. The key elements on the first part of the evaluation instrument covers the CEO's organizational responsibilities while the second part consists of open-ended questions dealing on the personal leadership qualities.

The first campus the monitoring team visited was Andrews with 101 respondents on December 11, 2017. The following day, Piat and Carig campuses were next visited having 90 and 179 respondents. On the third day, the campuses of Gonzaga, Aparri, and Lallo warmly greeted the team with welcome songs and each prepared a simple opening program to formally introduce the team and the rationale of the data gathering. The number of respondents were 93, 101, and 71 respectively.

On December 14, 2017, the team set off for Lasam campus having the smallest number of respondents with only 39. Finally, the last leg of the evaluation was at Sanchez Mira (SM) campus that showcased a splendid performance of their cheer dance group as the monitoring team was arriving at their grounds. The number of respondents totaled to 108.

Meanwhile, Regent Rex L.
Navarro, in his brief introduction, underscored five key areas on governance and management, quality teaching and learning, student support, professional exposure in research, and community relationship.

Leticia A. Dumlao, Director for UPQA assured the respondents that throughout the evaluation process, the data or information obtained shall be treated with confidentiality.

The result of the CEO Performance Evaluation forms part of the quality assurance which the University is crucially working on. This is also in compliance with State Universities and Colleges (SUC) Levelling, Institutional Sustainability Assessment (ISA), and the Medium-Term Development and Investment Plan (MTDIP) which shall be subjected for external evaluation.

# FIRST BATCH OF VIETNAMESE STUDENTS COMPLETE DOCTORAL DEGREE

Eifteen Vietnamese students enrolled in Doctor of Philosophy (Ph. D.) in Education major in English Language Education successfully defended their dissertation on October 13-14, 2017 at CSU Andrews Campus.

Meanwhile, three (3) more students are set to have their oral defense tentatively on January 22, 2018. However, only one is currently completing some lacking documents prior to defense of dissertation.

The doctoral students hold key positions in their respective institutions back home in Vietnam. The 1st batch has been enrolled under the doctoral degree program of the Graduate School during the second semester of 2014 and the 2nd batch on summer 2015. They are the first batch of Vietnamese doctoral candidates for graduation which shall be conferred in June this year.

CSU Graduate School Dean Lilia A. Tamayao said the foreign students had satisfactorily performed in their academics and research studies and have had fond memories together with their professors and their newfound friends at CSU.

Professor Tamayao said one challenge the faculty had difficulty memorizing was their names which are too tricky to remember and pronounce. One way of recognition was by assigning them English names that would easily be remembered and are closely associated with their personalities (e.g. Candy, Sunshine). Unlike our surnames or any Western names which normally comes last, their surnames come first and given names are written last. Their names, she said, however, have beautiful meanings behind it.

As a special taste of the CSUan culture and Filipino hospitality, the Office of the President threw a thanksgiving and send-off dinner for the 19 doctoral students on October 11, 2017, two days before the recent defense took place. It was then a night of festivity to culminate their threeyear full-time attendance to earn a doctoral degree.





## CSU PROPOSES PROJECT TO REHABILITATE GONZAGA MANGROVES



A target mangrove site in Gonzaga, Cagayan is waiting to undergo an urgent rehabilitation after being assessed as one of those ecosystems greatly affected by climate change and anthropogenic activities.

To help in the restoration and empowerment of communities, Cagayan State University (CSU) through President Urdujah A. Tejada, and her team, Director of Knowledge and Technology Froilan Pacris, and Director for Development and Extension Florante Victor M. Balatico presented to the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Gonzaga a project proposal entitled: Community Empowerment through Science, Technology, Education and Health (CESTEH): Conservation and Sustainable Utilization of Mangrove in Gonzaga, Cagayan.

The project proposal was presented personally to Gonzaga Mayor Marilyn S. Pentecostes and to the Sangguniang Bayan members of LGU-Gonzaga on December 12, 2017. Pres. Tejada and her team is hopeful that the project shall be able to help build resilient communities in the protection, restoration, conservation and sustainable utilization of mangrove ecosystems. On the other hand, Mayor Pentecostes expressed support to CSU's grassroots initiatives recognizing the important role of mangroves in the provision of livelihoods, coastal protection, and disaster risk mitigation among others.

Project CESTEH encompasses assessment and economic valuation, research and development, pilot project on bioengineering, livelihood, rural industry development, education, health and nutrition, ecotourism, and education and public awareness building.

This was an offshoot of the Momeradun of Understanding of CSU with Biotrop. President Tejada is bent on strengthening the partnership with Biotrop initialy through mangrove rehabilitation projects and other related activities.

The mangroves in the Philippines is one of the world's severely threatened and undervalued tropical ecosystems. According to the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), more than one in six mangrove species in the country are under threat of extinction and over 50% mangroves have already been lost.







#### PRESIDENT TEJADA PAYS TRIBUTE TO CHAIR LICUANAN

President Urdujah A. Tejada delivered a message for Hon. Patricia Licuanan as a tribute to her championing for Gender and Development on November 29, 2017 at the Sofitel Philippine Plaza Manila during the 5th Higher Education Summit on Gender Issues. She was chosen to represent all the private and public higher education institutions in the Philippines.

#### SPEECH OF **DR. URDUJAH ALVARADO TEJADA, CESO II**

"No one can better articulate the aspirations of women for equality, as well as their frustrations and anguish, than a woman. And no route is more expeditious and more promising towards cultivating a national culture of respect for all and dismantling the mechanisms of discrimination than education. This necessary combination of the credible enunciation of the cause of women by a woman and influence over the dynamics of education and its architectonics have felicitously come together in The Honorable Patricia Licuanan, Chair of

the Commission on Education and also principal architect of the higher education program on gender sensitivity and the elimination of discrimination. Tonight, we pay her tribute!

With Chair Licuanan taking the ship of higher education through then-uncharted waters. the Commission on Higher Education organized and hosted Gender and Discrimination summits from 2011 to 2013, with all State Universities and Colleges becoming parties to a GAD Accord in 2011. This committed all state higher education institutions in the country not only to the advocacy but more important to the concrete fruition of GAD concerns and such legal instruments as the Magna Carta for Women and their sources in international law, such as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.

CHED Memorandum Order No. 2015-01 laid down the guidelines on Gender Mainstreaming in higher education institutions, with the result that in each college or university, there is a distinct desk, office or

department that takes responsibility for the implementation of the Commission's GAD program. Chair Licuanan was not going to leave the realization of the goals of this endeavor to the vagaries of the goodwill or the indifference of college or university officials!

As a result of these directives from the Commission steered by its Chair, the research, extension and linkages departments of higher education institutions have transferred issues, plans, and activities on gender equality and the elimination of discrimination from the peripheries right to the very core of university and college life!

And the country's higher education institutions have responded not begrudgingly but with eagerness and with fervor. In the Cagayan State University – a university of eight campuses and close to thirty thousand students that I presently head, aside from a University GAD Director, each campus has a GAD Coordinator, and in the recently-formulated University Development Plan

covering 2016 to 2022, GAD occupies a prominent place in the development vision of the university and is one of the indicia of the university's growth and progress.

Very often in life, it does happen that she who sows is not always she who reaps. But in respect to the seeds of institutionalized attention, concern and active commitment to gender equality and to the dismantling of discrimination, Chair Patricia Licuanan has sown very good seeds, and she has been a most untiring sower. And while we look forward to a bountiful harvest in the future, even now, our Chair can take comfort in the heads heavy with grain with which God assures her that she has done not only well but admirably in serving the Filipino people and keeping them vigilant about that which is most precious and fundamental to us all - our humanity.

#### CSU BAGS P5 MILLION FROM HEIRIT

Php 5 million peso start-up capital was awarded to Cagayan State University (CSU) being one of the Top 20 awardees of the Technology Business Incubatees (TBI) in the country following a rigorous screening under the Higher Educational Institution Readiness for Innovation and Technopreneurship (HEIRIT) Development Program of the Department of Science and Technology- Philippine Council for Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD).

As a result of the initial evaluation conducted by DOST-PCIEERD, CSU was selected as one of the 48 Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) shortlisted to compete before the panel of evaluators from the University of the Philippines and other agencies. Fortunately, CSU was among the 20 chosen awardees as new incubatees for 2017 belonging to the second batch of TBI grantees.

The screening process included the visit of the DOST-PCIEERD team to the HEIs to oriented about the HEIRIT Development Program, the evaluation of documentary requirements, and the physical facilities of the universities.

The first ten (10) TBI grantees were given Php 10M start-up capital while the second batch are given Php 5M start-up capital.

Meanwhile, CSU President Urdujah A. Tejada signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with DOST-PCIEERD) on November 23, 2017 at the La Breza Hotel, Cebu City as the culminating activity during the First National Technology Business Incubation (TBI) Summit.

The event was participated in by the top 20 HEIs which were selected as new TBIs in the country. Ten existing TBI products and technologies were exhibited at the the two-day summit which was attended by the country's business tycoons to scout technologies for investment.

During the summit, Undersecretary Nora Terrado of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) delivered the first keynote address on "The Fablabs as a Strategy to Capacitate Technopreneurs in the Region." The address was followed with the presentation of the TBI Program's overview, goals and objectives, accomplishments to date, status of existing start-up grants, and plans, policies and programs by Russel Pili of PCIEERD. Azra'I Shu'Ib, the General Manager of the Incubation & Technopreneurs Development Technology Park Malaysia, talked about "Malaysia's Journey towards Building 4th Generation TBIs and their ASEAN Cooperative Scheme in Business Incubation" and Best Practices on Sustainability of TBIs in the second keynote speech. This was succeeded by a panel discussion on "How can TBIs improve the success rate for start-ups and incubatees?" led by Chancellor Liza Corro (UP Cebu), Vice Chancellor Jinky Bornales (MSU-IIT), Vice President Albert Amante (BatSU), Dr. Luis Sison (UP Enterprise) as panelists with Ms. Tina Amper as



the moderator.

Moreover, the TBI start-ups were given a chance onstage to introduce their products to the audience. All participants were also given the chance to sit with start-up Founders at the exhibit area for informal introduction and discussions. Another panel discussion was done on Innovation Ecosystem specifically on "The Role of Public-Private Partnership in the TBI's Productivity and Relevance" with panelists from the Department of Information and Communication Technology (DICT), Emmy Delfin. Department of Science and Technology's (DOST) Russell Pili. Department of Trade and Industry's (DTI) Nanette Arbon, Private Incubator, Diane Eustaquio and Sheryl Satorre from the academe with Ms. Katrina Chan as the moderator.

After which, "Tips and Tricks for TBIs and Innovators" was also presented on "Startup Success Story, Effective Collaboration between TBI." A series of case studies on "How we built our TBI; Challenges and Opportunities,"
"Branding and Social Media for
TBI," "Free and low cost ways to
promote your TBI and galvanize your community," "Start
Local, Get Global," and "How to
build your own micro Innovation
Ecosystem" were also discussed
following the panel discussion.

The third keynote address was delivered by DOST-PIEERD's Executive Director Carlos Primo C. David along "Building Ecosystems of Innovation in the Regions through Meaningful Science Initiatives." Exec. Director David also talked about DOST-Funded TBIs including the Launching of the PCIEERD HEIRIT Program with Prof. Nestor Rañeses as the Project Leader. This launching was followed with the most awaited Ceremonial Signing between the respective heads of the 20 Universities with the DOST Secretary, Honorable Fortunato De La Peña. Consequently, Secretary De La Pena delivered his closing remarks. 😸

## **Microtel UP Technohub**

SU Officials completed a three-day Extension Service Workshop with the theme "CSU Positioning as a Leader in Extension Service towards Local and Regional Growth and Development". The workshop, held on November 14-16, 2017, was participated in by 23 officials representing the campuses.

Dr. Urdujah Tejada, the first lecturer, presented the landscape of Cagayan State University focusing on the 2017-2022 strategic plan and framework and how these can achieve the university vision and mission. Research Development and Extension Vice President Junel Guzman continued the lecture by presenting the RDE goals, roadmap, strategic framework, programs and centers in the eight campuses. Dr. Florante Victor Balatico, Extension Director, capped off the lecture by presenting the CSU program components on training and skills development, technology adoption and utilization, technical assistance, advocacy and linkages and collaborations.

Dr. Sylvette Gunigundo of CHED's Office of Institutional Quality Assurance and Governance (OIQAG) lectured on how the Commission evaluates the Extension Service of an SUC as an indicator of institutional performance using different parameters. She emphasized that Extension Service is not only a Key Result Area to be met in SUC Levelling but more so in the sustainability of a Quality Assurance System of an SUC.

Prof. Tony Igcalinos of the UP National College of Public Administration and Governance stressed on the importance of having an Asset Inventory Management System for the optimization of all resources of a University to be competitive.

Dr. Odette Portus of the UP College of Mass Communication lectured on the importance of communication as it permeates all activities and encouraged CSU to design a research or evidence based communication plan for the University Extension Program. Commissioner Lilian A. De Las Llagas gave a crash course on Logical Framework Approach as a planning tool in crafting a Community Development Plan. The participants learned how to analyse problems using a Problem Tree and how to turn the problems into a positive solution using an Objective Tree.

The participants applied all the principles they learned in enhancing existing extension programs on coconut, indigenous people empowerment, apiculture, post-harvest technology and fish-
