CSU SOARS IN BOARD EXAMINATI

agayan State University has again showcased the quality of instruction in the institution by producing highcaliber graduates as shown in the recently concluded Medical Technology and Respiratory Therapy Board Examinations.

The College of Allied Health Sciences celebrated the 100% board performance as it also prided itself with S. Sales, RTRP took the 8th of two of its prime programs. Medical Technology recorded a 100% passing rate as all 31 of the graduates who took the September 2018 Licensure Examination were able to make the cut.

Respiratory Therapy experienced the same victory a 100% passing rate. All 78 takers were merited with a license. Additionally, the university also produced 3 graduates who made it to the Top 10 National Passers. Jocelyn D. Malamnao, RTRP placed 6th in the list. On the other hand. Christee Allen

spot and Donnell Jem Valenn D. Rizardo, RTRP finished in the 10th spot. The consistent excellence of the college in the Respiratory Therapy Board Examination has made CSU the top 1 performing school in the field with a national passing rate of 72.69%.







Meanwhile, CSU Carig Campus produced two national topnotchers in the August 2018 Board Examination for Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. Arvin T. Cuevas scored 82.84% gaining him the third place while Dr. Ferdinand A. Ramirez Jr. scored 82.54% garnering him the 9th place. Interestingly, these proud Baggaoeños were classmates from elementary to college. Both alumni are the top students of their class.

"I am greatly overwhelmed the performance of our alumni...This time, we made 2 topnotchers. This achievement of our graduates is also the achievement of the College, the Campus, and the University. This is also a proof that we

have been giving our best to provide quality education and we are very grateful that the administration has been very supportive in this endeavor." says the Dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, Dr. Maricel Campañano.

Dr. Kathlyn Bartolome Cruz, University Dean for the College of Agriculture, Fisheries, Medicine, and Veterinary further acknowledged people behind this achievement and expressed her gratitude towards the administration, by stating that "every inch of success received by the College of Veterinary Medicine will always be a blessing brought about by the joined forces of the faculty members, staff, and students."

Dr. Cruz also expressed her thanks to CSU Carig's CEO, Dr. Arthur G. Ibanez, for the construction of a new facility that will surely benefit the college. "This year, the college will be expecting to have its newly built CVM Building and hopefully a new Veterinary Clinic prior the 2021 Level III AACCUP Accreditation. The upcoming 2019 VMLE will be a challenge to the graduating students to be at par or to do better than their senior clinicians. Though few in terms of faculty and student population, the college always manages to deliver timely, efficient, and quality instruction."

CTED-ANDREWS BREEDS 12 REGIONAL TOPNOTCHERS

side from its commendable overall rating in the recently concluded Licensure for Examination Teachers (LET), where both Bachelor of Secondary Education (BSED) and Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) programs surpassed the national passing rate, the College of Teacher Education of Cagayan Andrews University, Campus produced 12 regional topnotchers.

Jeric Alfonso (BSED Physical Science) landed 1st Rank. Gian Marc Fernandez (BSED Mathematics) landed 5th Rank, Kristine Ann Taguba (BSED English) and Clarissa Dumanacal (BSED Social Science) both placed 7th and Dian Carlyn Dangilan (BSED Mathemetics) ranked 9th.

Meanwhile, the BEED program produced seven (7) topnotchers namely: Janine Claire Andres as 3rd Rank, Hazel Lioad as 4th Rank, Valerie Ann Pilos as 6th Rank, Mary Fe Carag, Ronalyn Malillin and Charmaine Sagaydoro as 9th, and Olivia Pagulayan as 10th Rank.

Significantly, the BSED obtained a passing rate of 83.67% as compared with 65.29% national passing rate while the BEED obtained 66.14% passing rate surpassing the national passing rate of 35.75%.

"This milestone in history of CTE is a product of the sterling commitment of the CTED workforce in helping aspiring teachers reach their dreams, something that I will be forever proud of as the College Dean", says Dr. Marie Claudette M. Calanoga.

CSU LAL-LO REGISTERS

agayan State University Lal-lo Campus has all the reasons to rejoice after it topped the university list as it registered the highest percentage in the September 2018 Board Examination Licensure for Teachers (BLEPT).

Data released from the Office of the Vice for President Academic Affairs showed that the College of Teacher Education of CSU Lal-lo Campus achieved 79 percent average rating for both Bachelor of Secondary Education (BSED) and Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) programs, outperforming the other seven campuses of the university in the said

examination.

Central campus-Andrews emerged second with 77 percent while Carig, Aparri, Sanchez Mira, Piat, Gonzaga, and Lasam followed with 74.28, 70, 61, 53.64, 47, and 46 percent performance, respectively.

The campus was also credited for their performance as they registered an 87.50 percent rating in the March 2018 BLEPT.

BEED first time takers, on the other hand, registered 50 percent rating and emerged as third in the list following Andrews and Aparri Campuses.

Aside from the the campus also joined the other campuses of the university in producing regional topnotchers this year as Ms. Cherry C. Vitin, BSED Major in Filipino, emerged at the 9th spot in the regional ranking of takers.

It was reported that the last time CSU Lal-lo produced topnotchers was in 2015 when Ms. Zarina Kate Laggui landed 8th in the national level and 1st place in the regional level. On the other hand, Mr. Allan Tabuyo filled the 8th spot in the regional level.

Lauding the efforts of the takers, Dr. Robert G. Carbonell, College Dean, reported that both programs also surpassed the national passing rates as well as the university passing target for

"We are way above the national passing rate and university passing target... that speaks of quality of instruction. The efforts of our takers must be commended and recognized for bringing the college and the campus on top," the dean said.

"We are happy at the performance that our graduates have been displaying since then... we hope to maintain good performance in the licensure exam to bring the university's name on top," the Dean stressed.

CSU CAMPUSES PURSUE FOOD INNOVAT



ne campus, one product. This is Cagayan State University's slogan in its effort to promote each campus' product to the community. Thus, the University Food Innovation Center (FIC) convened the extensionists, food technicians, and product developers from the campuses for a Product Development Proposal Writing Workshop last Dec. 12, 2018 at the Cagayan State University Piat Campus Integrated Farm.

The workshop focused on fitting the proposals according to the Department of Science and Technology's (DOST) design tool. Mac Luven Gonzalez, the University Coordinator for CSU-DOSTo2 Food Innovation Center, presented the parts of the

proposal which the participants must use as a format.

"CSU has different products waiting to be explored and experimented," University President Urdujah Tejada, Ph.D. said. "It is time for us to package and commercialize them. Let us take advantage of your expertise and the presence of the Food Innovation Center. DOST can also help us fund our food development projects if we give them well prepared, practical and relevant proposals" she added.

The whole-day workshop started with a brainstorming among the participants to decide on the product that their campus intends to promote. The main criteria was to write the proposal based on the DOST format and proposed presentation. Finally, each campus presented their proposal to a panel of experts.

University Officials from the Research Development Office composed the members of the panel. It was headed by Dr. Flor Dumlao, the University Technical Adviser. The panel included Junel Guzman, Ph.D., University Vice President for Research Development; Josie Bas-Ong, Ph.D., University Director for Extension; Vilma Conrado, Ph.D., University Director for Research; and Gilbert Mangulod, University Director for Knowledge Technology Management.

CSU EYED AS METALS AND ENGINEERING INNOVATION CENTER IN REGION 2

n an inception meeting last December 13 2018, Metals Industry Research and Development Center (MIRDC) Deputy Director, Engr. Agustin Fudolig presented to DOST Ro2 officials led by RD Sancho Mabborang and President Tejada and other CSU officials, a regional partnership program which aims to strengthen capacity and capability of the metals industry in Region 02 by establishing a Metals and Engineering Innovation Center in CSU.

RD Sancho Mabborang thanked the MIRDC for setting the direction to address the growing problem of metals in the region. He further encouraged CSU to be an active partner in Metals Industry in Cagayan Valley. He sees this as a potential to strengthen the Food Innovation Center of DOST-CSU considering the unavailability of local fabricators of food processing equipment in the country. The Director assured that v



the support he will extend to the metals industry will be comparable to the assistance the agency has espoused to the food and agriculture sectors after a thorough consultation with stakeholders have ensued.

On the other hand, President Tejada thanked MIRDC and DOST RO2 for considering Cagayan State University as a partner academic institution in the project. She is hopeful that with the project, the training for students in designing and crafting machines will be enhanced. She also sees a future for faculty and student immersion in neighboring countries. The President is positive that the campuses, as they work towards their niches in research, extension, and product development, shall provide a strong support to the Metals and Engineering Innovation Center, which in turn will also be a beneficiary of the Food Innovation Center. Seeing a strong potential in the project, President Tejada said she will open positions for mechanical engineers to strengthen its human infrastructure.

CSU CARIG HOUSES ANOTHER INNOVATION CENTER

he Metals Industry Engineering Research and Development Center (MIERDC) was established for the advancement of metal industry and engineering technologies for the country's stakeholders.

This Innovation Center is a joint venture between Cagayan State University (CSU) through the College of Industrial Technology (CIT) and the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) Regional Office o2 under a Memorandum of Agreement signed on January 22, 2015.

To strengthen the pilot center, a group from the CIT and the College of Engineering (COE) together with representatives from the DOST Region 2, conducted a Road Mapping Seminar-Workshop last March 5 to 6, 2015. This is to help MIERDC in plotting its direction, target programs, and activities.

Furthermore, visits to different metal establishments as

part of benchmarking were held in industries and institutions like DOST-Metals Industry Research and Development Center (MIRDC), DOST-ADMATEL, CLSU, Department of Agriculture-Philmex, PSAU, Cebu City, Pozorobo.

A series of meetings, workshops, and trainings were also held to increase capacity building of the center's human resource. This includes the use of Plasma Cutter which was introduced in order to improve the skills of faculty members as well as students who are working for the Center. Other activities held in the center involve Basic Occupational Safety and Health (July 7-10, 2016), Electroplating (July 13-15, 2016), and CNC Milling Programming and Operations (May 27-29, 2015).

Through the financial assistance from DOST RO2, the center was able to acquire state of the art equipment like Lathe Machine, TIG and MIG Welding

Machine, SMAW Machine, and Plasma Cutter. Moreover, as a counterpart, CSU has funded the renovation of the technology building to house the center. It was inaugurated by DOST Secretary, Prof. Fortunato Dela Pena, DOST RO2 Director Dr. Sancho Mabborang, and University President, Dr. Urdujah Tejada last August 12, 2018.

In connection to the program, the researchers in the center defended two significant research studies last August 28-29, 2018 to PCIEERD. The title of the studies are "Enhancement of the Blacksmithing Industry at Larion Bajo, Tuguegarao City through Science & Technology (S&T) Intervention" and "Design and Development of Equipment for Carabao Milk Candy Production in Cagayan Valley". The former is a collaborative work from the LGU Tuguegarao, DOST RO2, and the CSU-MIERDC.

APARRI CPDO HOSTS TWO-DAY CAMPUS PLANNING WRITESHOP

he Campus Planning and Development Office (CPDO), headed by the Campus Executive Officer, Dr. Simeon R. Rabanal Jr., in coordination with the University Planning Committee, concluded a two-day Campus Planning Writeshop at the Nassim Hotel and Beach Resort located in Sta. Ana, Cagayan on November 28 and 29, 2018.

The two-day Campus Planning Writeshop was held to harmonize the targets of college deans, unit heads, and campus designated officials with the university targets and performance indicators set in the Cagayan State University Development Plan, SUC Levelling Metrics,

Peformance-Based Bonus (PBB) Evaluation Measures, CHED-ISA Certification Requirements, and Philippine Development Plan Targets. The writeshop aimed to put the efforts of CSU Aparri Campus contributory to a better university performance, attainment of higher SUC Levelling Status, and entitlement for upper PBB rank.

Dr. Simeon R. Rabanal, Jr. commenced the first day by engaging the 34 attendees in a conceptual tour of the university plan anchored along instruction, research, extension, and production. CEO Rabanal talked about the performance commitment of

the campus as its share in the university accomplishment through a well-orchestrated plan, highlighting the efforts of faculty, staff, students, and stakeholders in support to the banner program in fisheries, along its aquaculture niche.

Meanwhile, Dr. Florentina S. Dumlao, University Planning Consultant, set the direction for campus planning and discussed the Key Result Areas (KRAs) concerning SUC Levelling. Dr. Laura A. Lintao, Technical Planning Staff, presented the mechanics and guidelines of the action planning.

The University Planning Committee, which reviewed and critiqued the outputs presented by the college deans and office heads, was impressed by the excellent plans and well-organized program of actitivies. The Action Plan Presentation of the participants evidently harmonized with the targets converged with the university goals, objectives, and performance indicators.

The successful conduct of the two-day Campus Action Planning Writeshop is a strong manifestation of the serious commitment of the CSU Aparri family in support to the administration of the University President, Dr. Urdujah A. Tejada, for a more credible and highly famed university system.

CSU NOW A TUKLAS LUNAS DEVELOPMENT CENTER

A financial grant amounting to 14.9M was given by the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) for the research project entitled, "Non-Toxic Plant Extracts from Region 02 for Infection and Pain" which forms a part of the research program entitled "Development of Standardized Anti-Infective and Anti-Pain Herbal Products from Region 02". This is accented by a MOA signing between CSU and DOST which formally warrants Tuklas Lunas Development Center

(TLDC) to fully operate.

The grant was given after the Tuklas Lunas Team of Cagayan State University, led by President Urdujah A. Tejada, successfully presented the research program and the first research project under it to the governing council of DOST's Philippine Council for Health Research and Development last November 14, 2018.

DOST Undersecretary Rowena Guevarra and PCHRD Executive Director Jaime Montoya expressed their appreciation and support to CSU for conducting such a worth investing project.

CSU, on the other hand, allocated a total of 1.3 M for the said project. This is to complete the 16 M proposed budget for the research. The team for the first project will be led by Prof. Nenette T. Columna, while the TLDC's Focal Person is Dr. Mary Jane C. Calagui.

The cooperating agencies for this project are DOST RO2, UP Diliman National Institute of Molecular Biology and Biotechnology, National Commission on Indigenous People, NVSU, ISU, BSC, National Historical Institute and other LGUs.

TLDC was conceived to address the growing problem of antibiotic resistance that has now become a global threat. Situated in a region that is abundant with a luscious flora variety, the center targets to investigate plant species for its medicinal property. It exists to develop standardized anti-infective and anti-pain herbal products from the region.





CSU ANDREWS EXPANDS LIBRARY AREA

"With the growing population of the campus, it is necessary to expand the library at the same time adhere to the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and the Accreditation requirements set for CSU-Andews", CEO Dimalanta said.

She however clarified that the old CVCAT building, which is the present library building for Andrews, will not be demolished as it is considered as a landmark

in CSU Andrews.

"There is no need to worry because we (the admin) see the value of the old CVCAT building so rest assured that it will be preserved and will not be demolished" she added. The library expansion area will be the building between the old library and the Athena building.

"There were suggestions that that part (back part of the library) will be turned into a park so students will have a place to stay but if we expand the library in that area instead of a park, then it will be a much better place for the students to stay", Dimalanta explained.

Ronaldo Sumait, the University Librarian expressed his joy for the library expansion. He is glad that the perennial problem on library area for Andrews will now have a solution since he mentioned that only a few of the Andrews student population could be accommodated in the current library space.

Sumait said that measures have been employed to address the library problem in Andrews.

"We have requested the deans to put up small libraries in their colleges", he said.

The Andrews library also caters to the graduate school and the College of Law.



Centeno, the 2016 most outstanding youth farmer of the Philippines, is again recognized as one of the country's young farming icons in the 2018 TOFARM's "Search for Outstanding Farmers of the Philippines" held last November 28, 2018.

After a rigorous selection, Centeno bested the other three finalists by bagging the silver award for Young Farmer Category. This granted him his second national award as a young agriculturist.

The first year Bachelor of Agricultural Technology student was first recognized in agriculture in 2016 when he was hailed by the Agricultural Training Institute and Department of Agriculture

Outstanding Youth Farmer" that year.

Centeno endeavors promote agriculture among the Filipino youth by managing his own integrated farm in Taguntungan, Baggao Cagayan as early as when he was 15 years old.

The now 20-year-old agriculture student manages two hectares of rice field, half hectare of cornfield, and two 500-square meter fishponds.

"Agriculture seemingly unpopular among us [youth], thus becoming less emphasized while we cling into it for survival. I want my fellow youth to recognize that agriculture is a partner for achieving whatever dreams they have in life," he said.

Non-experimental researches include "Lived Experiences Teacher Education of Faculty Researchers" by Jay Emmanuel Asuncion and Rudolf T. Vecaldo (1st placer), "Code-Switching in Philippine Literature" by Shella dela Cruz

Discourse Analysis Along Adjacency Pairs in English as a Second Language" by Ria Tamayo (3rd placer).

In the Development category, where 37 extension programs competed, three were selected to compete in the regional with the titles: "Community Empowerment through Science and Education, Technology, Environmental Protection and Health (CESTEEPH): A Collaborative Community-Based Program for the

Restoration and Sustainable Utilization of Mangrove Ecosystem in Gonzaga and Pamplona, Cagayan" by Dr. Froilan A. Pacris (1st place), "Barangay Kaagapay" by Jan Justin Rodriguez (2nd place), and "Food Processing, Baking, Event Organizing and Catering in Schools and Communities" by Prof. Sally Jane Cabalbag (3rd place).

The competition was held at DA-CVRC, San Felipe, Ilagan City.





PRESIDENT TEJADA PRESENTS CESTEEPH PROGRAM IN INDONESIA

a manifestation of the University's commitment to its existing partnership with SEAMEO BIOTROP, President Tejada presented a paper entitled "Community Empowerment through Science, Technology, Education, Environmental Protection. and Health (CESTEEPH): A Collaborative Community-based Program for the Conservation, Restoration and Sustainable Utilization of Mangrove Ecosystems in Gonzaga, Cagayan, Region 02, Philippines" during the 3rd International Conference on Tropical Biology in Bogor, Indonesia last September 21, 2018.

The only panelist from the Philippines during the panel discussion on the Future Directions in Conservation, Enhancement, and Sustainable Use of Indigenous Tropical Flora and Fauna, Dr. Tejada presented the CESTEEPH program which is a multi-agency program having CSU as the lead agency and with Dr. Froilan A. Pacris, Ir. as the program leader. This

program is an offshoot of a MOA signing between CSU and SEAMEO Regional Center for Tropical Biology (Biotrop) in Brunei, Darussalam on October 18, 2017 to form a cooperation on the joint implementation of RDE activities on tropical biology and related concerns with focus on the conservation and sustainable use of Mangrove Ecosystem. This is in line with the thrust of the university to strengthen linkages and collaborations with local and international academic and research institutions and to put CSU in the global academic map.

In her presentation, Pres. Tejada highlighted the various mangrove restoration efforts of the university and partner agencies in the coastal communities of Gonzaga, Cagayan to include capacity building, academic and community involvement, and research.



CSU GONZAGA LAUNCHES "GULAYAN SA BAWAT TAHANAN" AS AN EFFORT TO MITIGATE POVERTY

agayan State University Gonzaga through the Campus Extension Office and in partnership with the Local Government Unit of Gonzaga launched its extension program dubbed as "Gulayan sa Bawat Tahanan" on September 26, 2018.

The program aims to mitigate poverty by improving the quality of life of the rural and urban households in the service area. Under this extension program, CSU pioneered an integrated home gardening project with the purpose of encouraging all agriculture students and households to go green right at their homes.

Once the farmer-cooperators are ready to establish their own home garden, CSU will provide them farm inputs. The farmer-cooperators are expected to encourage at least two neighbors to practice home gardening to ensure the sustainability and the expansion of the project.

In his message during the opening program, Dr. Froilan A. Pacris, Campus Executive Officer of CSU-Gonzaga, stressed that the campus should

be an organic farm model for the farmer-cooperators to imitate. Likewise, he also mentioned that a reward will be given to the participating model farmer-cooperator.

Gulayan sa Bawat Tahanan Extension Program is one of the components of the CSU-CESTEEPH (Community Empowerment through Science, Technology, Education, Environmental Protection, and Health) project which was launched at Brgy. Caroan, Gonzaga, Cagayan on April 20, 2018.

Initially, the program was introduced to the fisherfolks of Barangay Caroan, Gonzaga, Cagayan in August 2018. Thirty fisherfolks from the said barangay attended the "Training-Workshop on Gulayan sa Bawat Tahanan" on September 25-26, 2018 where they were trained on the different methods and procedures of establishing home gardens.


Rachel Miguel, a self-assured PWD, cleverly discussed to the audience what to do when sexually harrassed.

he College of Teacher Education of Andrews Campus has catapulted the name of the university into the limelight after receiving two (2) quality assurance certificationsone international and one national-before 2018 concluded.

These remarkable back-to-back achievements make CTED-Andrews the first college to have received ISO Certification and AACCUP Level III Accreditation in the history of the university.

Through the leadership

of Dr. Marie Claudette Calanoga and the unwavering support of the CSU Administration, the college was able to hurdle consecutive audits by CSU ISO Internal Auditors and TUVSUD External Auditors with good remarks.

After satisfying the requirements of the standard upon which the audit was based, the organization has been recommended for certification to Quality Management System (ISO 9001:2015).

Alongside with the ISO

Certification is the awarding of Level III AACCUP Accreditation of the BEED Program. The award was conferred to the college after the successful compliance of mandatory requirements and recommendations given by AACCUP.

Meanwhile, the Level III award for the Bachelor of Secondary Education was held in abeyance due to a pending compliance of one (1) of the mandatory requirements for Level III.

"Being the core

for ISO program was not an easy task. It was a tough battle coupled with expectations. towering But with the support of the CSU Administration and the CTED family, we were able to make it. The college has been exposed to quality assurance undertakings that is why ISO certification was successfully hurdled. I just hope that before October 2019, the college will receive the Level III AACCUP Accreditation for the BSED Program," Dr. Calanoga underscored.

CSU GONZAGA'S GROTTO AND ITS STORY OF A NEW BEGINNING

ne of the remarkable distinctions of CSU-Gonzaga is the presence of Mt. Tabungao. This mountain cradles all the aspirations of the Campus from conception to its established status at present.

As Mt. Tabungao soars its peak, CSU-Gonzaga also incessantly harbors and guarantees that learning will always be at its peak, proving that education is always for the best, of the best, and by the best.

At the heart of Mt. Tabungao is the image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The CSU Grotto as it is popularly known was built in 1998 through the concerted efforts of the Student Body Organization of the then CSU Laboratory High School, the faculty, and the staff of CSU-Gonzaga under the

administration of the Campus Dean, Dr. Pedro Tugade.

It is unfortunate to

note though that the grotto lost its light for a couple of years. In some informal conversations in the community, some locals of Gonzaga attribute the calamities that the municipality has been through recently to the absence of light from the CSU-Grotto which used to be their source of light in the darkness of the night.

Looking into this significance of the Sacred Heart of Jesus grotto to the community, plans have been made to reestablish the grotto and develop it into an ecotourism park, which is one of the components of the emerging thrust of CSU-Gonzaga dubbed as 3Fs-Faith, Farm, and Fun. Once it is fully established, the Sacred Heart of Jesus grotto can be a Holy Week destination in the part of the province.

As an initial step to this

plan, the ceremonial lighting of the grotto was held last October 12, 2018 with the presence of the Chair of the CSU Board of Regents, CHED Commissioner Lilian de las Llagas, University President, Dr. Urdujah A. Tejada and the CSU-Gonzaga community.

It was a timely activity especially that Gonzaga was still recovering from the devastation caused by typhoon Ompong. For a Gonzaganian whose high hopes were blown in an instant by the unforgiving winds of the typhoon, the lighting of the grotto of the Sacred Heart of Jesus ignites a new hope; it symbolizes a new hope; it symbolizes a new beginning. CTE PIAT NOW CHED COMPLIANT

fter passing the policies and standards of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), Piat Campus' College of Teacher Education (CTE) is now CHED compliant as issued last August 17, 2018.

The college passed the

The college passed the criteria set in areas of Faculty, Administration, Curriculum and Instruction, Physical Plant, Laboratories and Facilities, and Research and Extension among others.

According to Dr. Jocelyn D. Tuliao, CTE Dean , the college was

evaluated twice: first was through a Preliminary Survey Visit from the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities of the Philippines (AACCUP) last June 26 and 27. The result was issued to the dean last July. This was followed by the Regional Quality Assessment Team (RQAT of CHED) last June 8 whose findings were validated by the Educational Supervisor that is in-charge of the CTE in the name of Dr. Alma Abrico.

"I am very happy because we were able to meet all the

requirements required by CHED for the program compliance for both BEED and BSED." Dean Tuliao said.

Prior to the evaluation, the faculty of CTE prepared documents for the different areas needed for the assessment such as legal files, researches, extensions, membership to organization, students, faculty, faculty development, and curriculum and instruction.

Dean Tuliao admitted that she was much pressured back then because CTED was the only college out of the four colleges which was not yet CHED compliant.

"When I received the certificate, I was overwhelmed. This is a great accomplishment on my part as a dean. Also, I'm proud to say that we are more competitive now because we met the standards set by CHED," Tuliao stated.

Dean Tuliao further added that compliance of CTE would greatly help them pass or meet the challenges of evaluations by different agencies in the future.

The Dean is waiting for CHED's approval of the said proposal as to whether the University is fit to cater the additional programs and will be implemented next year if approved.





WRITESHOP SEMINARS INTENSIFY OUTCOMES-BASED EDUCATION IMPLEMENTATION

of fortify the implementation of Outcomes-Based Education (OBE) in the university, a joint project of the CSU Carig Campus, headed by CEO Arthur Ibanez, through the Office of the Campus Director for Academic Affairs, then headed by Dr. Lirio Gudina C. Mangawil, and the Office of the Vice President for Partnership and Mobilization, headed by Dr. Lina Garan, was conceptualized.

This involved a partnership with the US Peace Corps Response Volunteers (US-PCRV) which provided experts in curriculum design and instructional materials development, in the persons of Dr. Robert Leier and Prof. Owen

Roach, to assist in the review and development of OBE syllabi and instructional materials. This eventually became a joint project of three (3) offices: CSU Carig Campus, Office of the VPRM, and Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs.

A series of university-wide trainings and workshops spearheaded by the Office of the VPAA, headed by Dr. Mariden Ventura-Cauilan, and implemented by the Office of the Director of Instruction (ODI) were conducted from August to November of 2018. In August 23-24, 2018, a university-wide OBE Syllabi Writeshop was conducted simultaneously in CSU Andrews,

Aparri, Carig, and Sanchez Mira campuses which was participated by a total of 139 faculty members from all the eight campuses. Faculty members consisting of deans, department chairs, and program coordinators who were trained during the Trainers' Training held in Sta. Ana, Cagayan on July 29 to August 1, 2018 served as resource speakers and facilitators during the 2-day writeshop. The syllabi outputs were reviewed by concerned university deans for finalization.

Moreover, a two-phased Writeshop on Module Development for General Education Curriculum (GEC) Core Courses was conducted in October 17-19, 2018 (Phase 1) and November 21, 2018 (Phase 2) to create an avenue for faculty members to start preparing and developing modules/textbooks for the new GEC courses. The event was attended by 48 faculty members coming from the 8 campuses. The resource persons included Dr. Antonio Tamayao and Dr. Romeo Clemente, who both published notable IMs. US PCRVs Prof. Owen Roach and Dr. Abby Wrinkler-Crowley were also present as keynote speakers.

The projects are expected to add more trained IMs writers capable of producing instructional materials for utilization in the university.



CSU GONZAGA NOW A TRAINING & ASSESSMENT CENTER IN RICE MACHINERY OPERATION





ESDA awarded a TVET Program Registration to CSU Gonzaga to offer a program in Rice Machinery Operation NC II with a duration of 232 hours last September 11, 2018.

CSU Gonzaga is the first in the region to be awarded as a Training Center and Assessment in Rice Machinery under the Unified TVET Program Registration and Accreditation System or UTPRAS. The UTPRAS is a regulatory mechanism of TESDA which ensures that direct programs undergo strict quality control. During the launching program,

TESDA Provincial Director Romeo Talosig said that this endeavor shall provide doors to train 21st century global workers and shall be another beginning of addressing poverty in the countryside. University TVET Director Herbert Imatong said he is hopeful that through this program registration, CSU shall be able to send TVET students to international competitions. On the other hand, President Tejada expressed her gratitude to TESDA for its continued assistance to many programs of the university and hopes to expand more

partnerships in the future. She also commended CEO Froilan Pacris for his leadership in the campus and acknowledged the three great minds of CSU Gonzaga referring to CEO Froilan Pacris, TVET Director Herbert Imatong and former Extension Director Vic Balatico whose perfect blend results to productive programs for CSU Gonzaga. President Tejada also challenged CSU to come up with promising results through meeting standards, processes, and quality outputs.

ČEO Pacris also expressed 100% commitment

to the program on behalf of 57 faculty members and 63 administrative staff to make their services effective, efficient, and relevant to the needs of their stakeholders. wenty scholars under the CSU-TESDA Training for Work Scholarship Program received National Certification II (NC II) in Rice Machinery Operation during the graduation exercises for the first batch of scholars in Rice Machinery Operation (RMO) held in CSU-Gonzaga on December 7, 2018.

The beneficiaries of the scholarship program given by CSU and TESDA went through 232 hours of intensive training in operating different machineries and equipment for rice handling. The gears comprise of machines and equipment for land preparation, rice crop

establishment, rice crop care, rice harvesting and threshing, rice drying, and rice milling.

The newly certified operators are now included in TESDA website's list of registered rice machinery operators which gives them a fair advantage in job applications.

Meanwhile, TESDA Provincial Director Romeo O. Talosig emphasized in his message that the scholarship program given by CSU and TESDA will provide more opportunities to displaced workers due to mechanized farming. He also encouraged CSU to open more TVET assessment centers in other campuses

to give more opportunity to the marginalized sectors. At present, CSU Gonzaga is the only institution with registered Rice Machinery Operation Assessment Center in Region 02.

President Urdujah A. Tejada expressed her gratitude to TESDA for granting a total of 170,000 Php for the scholarship of the graduates and for trusting Cagayan State University Gonzaga as the Training and Assessment Center for Rice Machinery Operation.

"My words are never enough to express my gratitude to you all for contributing to the achievements of the University. I know that we all have the same advocacy – to improve the lives of every Cagayano and non-Cagayano by us providing the best education, and partnering with TESDA is always a valuable endeavor. I fervently hope that our partnership will be strengthened in the years to come" said President Tejada in her message.

s part of strengthening and empowering the activities of the campus extension program, the Collaborative and Participatory Cacao Processing Program was implemented.

This project was funded by the university with an amount of 200,000 pesos. The trained cacao growers were able to purchase their own equipment for processing. They were also able to attend trainings and exhibits where they displayed and sold their products. An amount of 50,000.00 php was also donated by Dr. Jerry Jurado Cares Foundation for Transforming the Lives of Agays through Literacy and Livelihood Trainings wherein 39 Agays became recipients of scholarships and a medical and dental mission.

For the campus niche, the GIA fund of the Department of Science and Technology amounting to 350,000.00 php was also granted to the campus extension program for fixed assets, personal services, and equipment for the processing of fine chocolate products,

training of cacao growers for the processing of cacao beans for value adding, and for the packaging and labeling of processed outputs in order to be competitive in the market.

Nineteen trainings were also conducted for cacao growers, banana planters, and the Agays through the office of the Extension Coordinator, Prof. Bernard P. Madarang, and participated by the three colleges of the campus namely the College of Industrial Technology, College of Information and Computing Sciences, and College of Teacher Education.

In addition, linkages/partnerships to numerous stakeholders and members of the community were also strengthened including demonstration areas that were established and adaptors with profitable enterprises.

Through collaborative effort of the Campus Research Team and the faculty researchers, a total of eleven research papers were published and is broken down as follows: 1 in Elsevier- Scopus, 8 in Thomson

Reuters- ISI (Clarivate Analytics) and 2 in a CHED-recognized journal.

In addition. research papers were presented in national, regional, and local conferences.
